Charles Lyman Eustis died at Beaufort, SC July 3. He was the son of Joseph Eustis, a Maine pioneer, and was for many years a prominent citizen of Dixfield where he was engaged in trade, lumbering, in woolen manufacture, built lumber mills and was engaged in running them, beside doing much at farming. With others he purchased wild lands, one parcel being that, now the town of Eustis, in Franklin county named in his honor. He was a member of the first Orthodox church organized in Dixfield. In 1839 he moved to Augusta, where he remained only a short time, when he returned to Dixfield. Several years ago he moved to Auburn, and later went to Beaufort, SC. To Mr Eustis' energy, public spirit and business capacity Dixfield village owed very much of the prosperous growth from 1825 to 1850.

Mr. C.L. Eustis, a very aged gentleman, who had ben in feeble health for a long time, departed this life on the night of the 2nd. The remains were laid to rest in the shadow of the Beaufort Baptist Church. Mrs P.M. Whitman, the daughter of the deceased, after the funeral took Mrs Eustis back to Augusta with her.
