Ora Eddy, Spanish War Veteran, Dies

HOLD FINAL RITES WED-NESDAY FOR HUSBAND OF FORMER ARLOU TORRENCE

Ora Eddy, 80, respected and beloved brother-in-law of Mrs. Don Shockey of here, passed away at 6:30 a. m. Monday in Brown Veterans Hospital, Dayton. Mr. Eddy was transferred to Dayton from Mary Rutan Hospital, Bellefontaine, on February 3rd.

The deceased was born in Hardin County on February 8, 1880, the son of Jonathan and Mary Oglesbee-Eddy. His marriage to Sarah Arlou Torrence, sister of Mrs. Shockey, took place on November 26, 1907.

As a young man he volunteered into the service of his country and served with Co. I, 2nd Ohio Volunteer Infantry, during the Spanish-American War. He was a member of the old Kenton Reds championship basketball team.

On September 1, 1945, Mr. Eddy retired as a New York Central engineer after serving in that capacity since May 24, 1909. He started with the railroad company or February 8, 1906, as a fireman or what was then known as the "Big Four" railroad.

For many years, Mr. Eddy served on the board of directors of the Railroad YMCA in Bellefortaine. He was a member of the Masonic lodges and the First Prebyterian Church in Bellefontain was affiliated with the Brothenhood of Locomotive Engineers; arwas an honorary member of the Logan County Fish and Game A sociation, which he had served a president.
